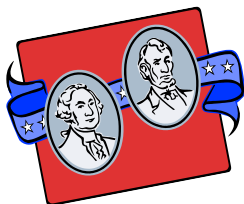
## LIBRARY HOURS

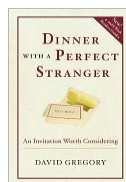

A I don't have a favorite author but for inspiration I read books by Max Lucado.

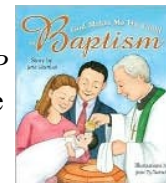
Q What would you like to see accomplished at the library?
